

N'Amerind, city pledge mutual respect, trust

London city hall and N'Amerind Friendship Centre signed an agreement pledging mutual commitment and friendship, a move the Indigenous organization's president described as strengthening the "ground rules for collaboration."

The declaration, one of many across the province between municipalities and friendship centres, is aimed at building trust and respect between local governments and Indigenous people.

"There's been a lot of work that's already been done, but what this agreement will do is enhance it, will set some ground rules for collaboration, for cooperation, for helping. It'll mutually benefit both parties, the urban Indigenous population and the city of London itself," said Brian Hill, president of the N'Amerind Friendship Centre.

He cited ongoing projects, such as the city's community inclusion and diversity strategy, an Indigenous liaison office that's in the works at city hall, and work toward meeting recommendations from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.

It's about battling negative stereotypes and stigma that Indigenous people face in London and about fostering a stronger and more trusting relationship, he said. In June, city council unanimously acknowledged systemic racism in and outside of city hall and committed to addressing discrimination of Black and Indigenous peoples.

"Historically, London hasn't been a welcoming city for us, for a lot of reasons," Hill said.

"Hopefully this agreement will empower some people, empower some of our urban Indigenous people to stand up and take their place, take the place that we've earned, as being citizens of this city."

N'Amerind Friendship Centre is a non-profit offering social, recreational, and educational services, as well as a community for urban Indigenous people in London and others who need support. Hill described the centre as one that grew organically out of informal gatherings between Indigenous peoples who had left reserves and moved to urban centres, with London a central hub for those from Oneida Nation of the Thames, Chippewas of the Thames First Nation and Munsee-Delaware Nation.

There are 29 friendship centres across Ontario.

Hill said the London organization already has signed similar agreements with other local agencies, such as the Thames Valley District school board and Children's Aid Society.

The declaration of mutual commitment and friendship was signed at this week's Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) conference and it included a provincewide agreement with the Ontario Federation of Indigenous Friendship Centres.

Ward 9 Coun. Anna Hopkins, acclaimed to a second term on the AMO board and on Wednesday re-elected chair of the large urban caucus, cited the declaration as one of the conference highlights.

Hill said the agreement "will bolster, will enhance, will give more strength to these initiatives happening within city hall itself."

"We look at signing this as an indicator that the municipalities are going to start treating and dealing with us in a trustful and respective manner," he said.

"Having a truly collaborative, respectful, trustworthy relationship, we're just starting to get there." mstacey@postmedia.com

Province doles out \$1.5M for jobs training

The Ontario government is investing nearly \$1.5 million to support several skills training programs for students and workers across the London region.

The money is part of the provincial government's recovery plan for Ontario's pandemic-hammered economy, and aims to connect job-seekers with in-demand jobs.

We "need to make sure people can participate in the economic recovery," Monte McNaughton, a local MPP and Ontario labour minister, said at Wednesday's funding announcement in London.

"As we carefully reopen Ontario's economy, innovative training initiatives . . . are an essential part of our efforts."

Between March and June, the London region shed more than 30,000 jobs due to pandemic-induced business shutdowns, leading to the area's unemployment

rate reaching a 20-year high at 12.6 per cent.

Since then, the local economy has begun to rebound, adding 11,200 positions in July, a figure that includes people who were laid off at the height of the pandemic and have now returned to work. The unemployment rate for the region, which also takes in Strathroy, St. Thomas, and portions of Middlesex and Elgin counties, now sits at 10.5 per cent.

Even before the pandemic, about 204,000 jobs in Ontario were unfilled, costing the economy \$24 billion a year, said McNaughton, MPP for Lambton-Kent-Middlesex.

Filling those jobs and the ones lost to the pandemic has become even more important for the province's economic future, he said.

"This is our government's mission: to ensure that we have the workforce for the jobs of today and the jobs of tomorrow," McNaughton said.

Man sentenced to time served in London homicide

Nicholas George has been out of custody on strict bail conditions since April 24, the date he was supposed to be sentenced for manslaughter.

And he won't be returning to custody.

George, 20, was sentenced this week to time served, the equivalent of a four-year prison term, and placed on probation for three years.

There is a sweeping publication ban on many of the details of the case, including the name of the victim and other people involved in the case.

George was charged after a man was stabbed to death on Oct. 2, 2017 at 1 Lansdowne Ave. after an ongoing dispute between two groups of people.

George was asked to go to the address and was the last person to arrive there. Others were talking at the door when he got there.

George was expected to head upstairs in the house to deal with an occupant, while the rest of the group faced off with someone else in the basement. George wasn't aware there was a plan to kill anyone, but he knew two people in the group had knives and one had a wooden pole.

The front door was kicked in and George went upstairs and was injured in the face when something was thrown at him.

George could hear people banging around in the basement while he was leaving.

When everyone left the house, one member of the crew told George "I just . . . killed him."

Police were alerted and found two men injured. One was pronounced dead at the hospital and had numerous blunt-force injuries and six stab wounds, including a fatal stab wound to the chest.

Arrests were made after police used surveillance videos taken from various locations in the area.

Superior Court Justice Bruce Thomas heard several victim impact statements from relatives of the deceased before deciding on George's sentence.







Health workers want 2nd dose faster

TORONTO Thousands of health-care workers need to be prioritized for full immunization from COVID-19 as they work with patients hospitalized with the deadly virus, groups representing them said Thursday.

The Registered Nurses' Association of Ontario, Canadian Union of Public Employees, Service Employees International Union and the Ontario Nurses Association said they've asked the province to accelerate second doses for the workers but have received no commitment.

Health-care workers were among the first groups to be prioritized for a first dose. However, the province later extended dosing intervals for COVID-19 vaccines from 21 days to four months, which means many workers still are waiting for the second dose.

You are exposed during a 12 hour shift . . . to very ill patients that are COVID positive in emergency departments, in critical care units, in ICUs," said RNAO CEO Doris Grinspun. "One shot is not enough."

The president of CUPE's Ontario Council of Hospital Unions estimates thousands of workers in those facilities still haven't received their second dose.

Data on rates of health-care worker immunization has not been provided by the government, Michael Hurley added.

"Health-care workers are very challenging to replace," he said. "You would think that the government would want to take care of them."

Ontario's hospitals have been experiencing an extreme capacity crunch for months, a situation made worse during the third wave of COVID-19.

Admissions due to the virus have hit record highs, patients are being transferred between facilities. and health-care workers are being flown in from across the country to help Ontario.

The Ministry of Health said Thursday that 1,964 people are hospitalized because of the novel coronavirus, with 877 in intensive care and 600 on a ventilator.

SEIU Healthcare president Sharleen Stewart criticized Premier Doug Ford's government for not having a clear plan to fully immunize health-care workers.

More must be done to get the shot to staff who cannot spare time in the province's current, confusing, vaccine queue, she said.

"How are people supposed to be getting to these vaccination sites?" Stewart said. "They cannot line up for hours because they're so desperately needed back at the hospital. The easiest solution would be to bring it to the hospital, let the staff line up and let them get it."

Vicki McKenna, president of the Ontario Nurses Association, said vaccinating all "front-facing" nurses who care for COVID-19 patients is vital.

'(Nurses are) mentally and physically tired," she said. "It's really, really difficult, at the best of times, and the last thing we want is for them to feel vulnerable."

A spokesperson for Health Minister Christine Elliott said extending the interval between doses for up to four months has allowed Ontario to accelerate its vaccine rollout and maximize the number of people receiving protection.

"As we continue to receive more vaccines from the federal government, we may eventually be able to shorten the interval for all Ontarians," Alex Hilkene said.

Meanwhile, a report from Public Health Ontario offered insight into infections after vaccination.

It found that 0.06 per cent of the nearly 3.5 million Ontarians who received at least one dose of a COVID-19 shot by April 17 were infected while partially or fully vaccinated.

Of those, two-thirds were not yet protected by the vaccination when they contracted the virus, since their symptoms emerged less than two weeks after inoculation.

The report said post-vaccination cases declined "dramatically" as more time passed, with a "marked" decrease 28 days after a first dose. The Canadian Press

Area opioid OD deaths rose 66% to 101 last year

In London and surrounding Middlesex County, the number of deaths jumped to 101 from 60, an increase of 66 per cent, the report

December was the worst month yet for opioid overdose deaths in Ontario, with 249, and the coroner's report suggests the high rates are continuing in 2021. The report's findings are considered preliminary and have yet to be released or published on the provincial public health website.

The figures come as no surprise to leaders of London agencies working with people who use drugs.

Emergency calls for overdoses at the Salvation Army's Centre of Hope have doubled during the last year, as people are forced to deal with pandemic stresses while, at the same time, told to stay away from each other, said executive director Jon DeActis.

"It's just getting worse and it's getting harder and people are struggling more. There are not opportunities for coping. I can't imagine how people who are on the fringe struggle through something like this without tons of support."

Fentanyl continues to drive the increase in deaths, involved in 86 per cent of all opioid-related deaths in 2020, the provincial coroner's report said.

Each week, it seems London and area agencies get a report about something new found in local fentanyl, DeActis said.

'We have no idea what's in the fentanyl anymore," he said. "It's just horrible out there."

A sampling of fentanyl in Toronto from one week. Feb. 27 to March 12, 2021, found at least 10 variations of the opioid as well as other drugs, including tranquillizers and sedatives, a recent presentation from Andrea Sereda, a physician at the London InterCommunity Health Centre, showed.

In a 12-month span, starting in October 2016, the Toronto drug-checking service found no fewer than 16 variations of fentanvl and other drugs in fentanyl samples, Sereda's presentation said.

As the fentanyl supply becoming more uncertain, people's tolerances to the opioid, and their doses, are increasing, she told The Free Press Thursday.

Before 2020, usage in London was measured in tenths of a gram, with one to five tenths the average daily usage. After March 2020, average daily usage rose enough to begin being measured in full grams, now from 1.7 to 3.5 grams, or 17 to 35 points, her research

Sereda runs a safe-supply program for about 290 patients, providing clean hydromorphone while connecting them with other health and social services.

But the province limits what drugs are covered by benefits and as a result, what drugs she can provide, Sereda said.

"One drug that works for one person may not work for the next person. I need prescription fentanyl, I need high-dose liquid hydromorphone, I need heroin because the people in the safe-supply program are not the exact same person "she said

Money stops the Salvation Army from doing more, DeActis said.

The Salvation Army runs a recovery centre that always has people waiting for one of its 26 spots, he said.

We are hearing from the folks who have been in the program, 'Thank you, thank you, thank you,' and yet there is no money to increase it," he said.

"I think I could increase my beds in that program, even by 10, and I'd be full within a month.' The program is funded by a foun-

dation grant and an "angel donor" until December. DeActis said. "After that, I don't know what

we're going to do because I don't have sustainable funding for it." Attitudes toward people using drugs prevents proper supports from being put in place, Lazenby

With one of the two city emergency shelters shut down, and the second one set to close in June, people already are camping outside the Centre of Hope.

The deaths leave front-line workers feeling empty, said Allison DeBlaire, co-founder of 519Pursuit, an outreach organization that distributes food and supplies to people on the street.

"When we drive around the city it's hard to not look for these friends, it's hard not to carry on their legacy as someone who made our community whole," she said.

Review existing conditions



This study is following the process for a **Schedule C** project under the Municipal Class EA.

Existing Conditions

- Existing conditions were reviewed, including:
 - Structural conditions
 - Hydrological conditions
 - Cultural heritage potential
 - Natural environment features
 - Land use (existing and planned).





Further detailed review and analysis will be completed in subsequent phases.

Existing Conditions – Structural

- Constructed in 1912
- Single span through truss bridge
- Span length of approximately 35 meters
- Key findings of structural inspections:
 - Light to very severe deterioration, corrosion, and rust jacking
 - Bent diagonal member on the north truss.



Following a visual inspection of the bridge on September 5, 2019, the County closed the bridge to vehicular traffic and pedestrians due to structural deficiencies.



Existing Conditions – Hydrological

- Modelling results for the *design storm:*
 - Blacks Bridge meets the minimum flood clearance requirement of 0.3 m (clearance of approximately 0.39 m identified)
 - West Corner Drive is flooded approximately 60 m west of the bridge.

Design storm: rainfall event used as a basis for infrastructure design requirements.

Based on the road classification and bridge span, the design storm for Blacks Bridge is a 1-in-25-year storm.



Blacks Bridge "has direct associations with the themes of transportation improvement related to local development in this area, and the evolving approach to bridge replacement, reflecting engineering trends over time" (THMC, 2020).



Existing Conditions – Natural Environment

 Findings indicate potential for 8 Species at Risk (SAR) to be found at/ surrounding Blacks Bridge:

Mussels: 4 species

• Fish: 2 species

O Birds: 1 species

Vegetation: 1 species.

 The area is regulated by the Ausable Bayfield Conservation Authority (ABCA)

> O.Reg 147/06 requires a permit for development in the area.




All alternative solutions for Blacks Bridge, apart from the 'do nothing' alternative, have potential to impact SAR.



Existing Conditions – Land Use

- Primarily agricultural
- Limited rural residential
- Urban expansion is directed to the southern limits of Ailsa Craig
- Lands south of Blacks Bridge are protected for future urban expansion
 - The bridge would connect these potential future urban areas
- West Corner Drive is designated a Local Road.

Community Survey

- A total of 263 survey responses were received
- In general, respondents were locals who use Blacks Bridge for:
 - Agricultural operations
 - General day-to-day use
 - Recreation.

What We Heard - Key Themes



- Importance of Blacks Bridge for agricultural operations, as well as general connectivity and mobility
- Concern about potential commercial impacts to Ailsa Craig from closing the bridge
- Flooding issues identified in the area
- Perceived cultural/heritage significance of the bridge
- Blacks Bridge and Ausable River are used for recreational activities (cycling, walking, canoeing/kayaking)
- Concerns about delays to emergency service vehicles due to closure of the bridge
- Technical comments related to Blacks Bridge's condition and potential solutions.

In response to a survey question that asked, "What options do you feel should be considered for the study," approximately 91% of respondents selected replacement with a new 2-lane vehicular bridge, and less than 1% selected removal.



Project Need and Alternatives

Problem/ Opportunity

Blacks Bridge is currently closed to vehicular and pedestrian traffic due to structural deficiencies. An opportunity exists to evaluate long-term solutions for the water crossing, including opportunities to repair, replace, or remove the structure. The long-term solution should balance the needs and values of the local community with technical considerations and protection of the existing environment.

- The Class EA requires alternative solutions to address the problem/opportunity
- Five alternative solutions were identified, and were evaluated based on:
 - Potential impacts to the natural environment
 - Cultural and socio-economic considerations
 - Engineering performance and feasibility
 - o Relative capital costs.



"Do Nothing" Alternative

- Leave Blacks Bridge in place "as is"
- Screened out because it does not address the problem/opportunity
 - The bridge is closed due to structural deficiencies



Thank you for the opportunity to provide input on the Blacks Bridge Class Environmental Assessment. My comments are through my role of Land Stewardship Advisor for the Huron Tract Land Trust Conservancy/Ausable Bayfield Conservation Foundation which owns 4599 West Corner Drive (donated to us by Janet Heaman). This property is on the east and west side of the Ausable River on the south side of West Corner Drive.

The Land Trust has four goals for the property, known as Heaman Tract:

- 1. Environmental protection
- 2. Day use recreation area for picnics, walking and nature appreciation
- 3. Public access to the Ausable River for fishing, canoeing and kayaking
- 4. Access to the Ausable River for scientific research and monitoring by Ausable Bayfield Conservation Authority and other agencies such as Department of Fisheries and Oceans.

The bridge was closed to the public shortly after we received the donated land. This severed the connection between the two halves of the property. This requires the public (and staff) to take a much-longer route to access both sides of the property.

Historically, people have accessed the west side of the river for fishing and canoeing/kayaking. Slopes are gentle, making it a safer river access on this part of the property. Public access to the Ausable River is limited in Middlesex County. We would like to maintain this use of the property. This area is subject to flooding and we do not wish to build any structures, merely a small parking lot for a few cars. We would maintain a walking path to the river with a natural surface.

Picnics, walking and nature appreciation would mainly happen on the east side of the river, on higher ground. The hill to the river is steep and there is no good, safe place for people to launch a canoe or kayak. The river drops off quickly, making it a safety concern for parents and children.

I have reviewed the proposed alternatives for the future of the bridge through the lens of a land manager. I am not reviewing the alternatives through Section 28 of the Conservation Authorities Act, hydrology, water quality or fish habitat lens.

Maintaining a bridge across the Ausable river is important to us and the people who visit the property. This will allow the safest and best use of the two sides of the property. Alternative 1A or Alternative 2 would both meet the needs of the Land Trust. We do ask that any road reconstruction associated with the project would allow the Land Trust and the public to continue to access our property. Special consideration of traffic speeds, particularly on the west side of

the river would be important for public safety of people entering and existing the property. It would also be beneficial for any new structure to have a sidewalk, preferably on the south side of the river to allow people to safely walk from one side of the river to the other.

Good afternoon Brandon and Chris,

I attended the virtual PIC for Blacks Bridge.

I would like to provide comment in support of furthering consideration of rehabilitation options for Blacks Bridge. Based on the summary presented at the PIC, Blacks Bridge has met the criteria to be considered a built heritage resource.

With the bridge having been closes since 2019, this provides an opportunity to rethink how Blacks Bridge is used and functions in the community. Large equipment and other large vehicles have found other ways to get around. Rehabilitating Blacks Bridge for active transportation (my first preference) would help to ensure that this built heritage resource continues to be valued and used by the community.

In addition, rehabilitation options presented at the PIC were of lower capital cost (the recommended alternative of a new bridge was the highest cost with the highest adverse impacts to environment, heritage, and archaeology). (It was not clear to me from the PIC how rehabilitation would affect fish habitat).

Many other communities have embraced the cultural heritage value of their bridges - particularly Waterloo Region. See Waterloo Region's Heritage Bridge Recognition Program (which coincidentally includes a different Blacks Bridge): https://www.regionofwaterloo.ca/en/exploring-the-region/heritage-bridge-recognition-program.aspx#

If rehabilitation is not the ultimately recommended alternative for Blacks Bridge in this EA what will be done to ensure that a new structure is appropriate form a design perspective? A "standard" concrete bridge is a poor substitute for Blacks Bridge with its increasingly uncommon truss arch design. Can Blacks Bridge be relocated and used for active transportation or other uses elsewhere? Will there be documentation of the structure? Salvage? Commemoration through a plaque with text and images?

Please let me reiterate my support for rehabilitation options for Blacks Bridge.
